

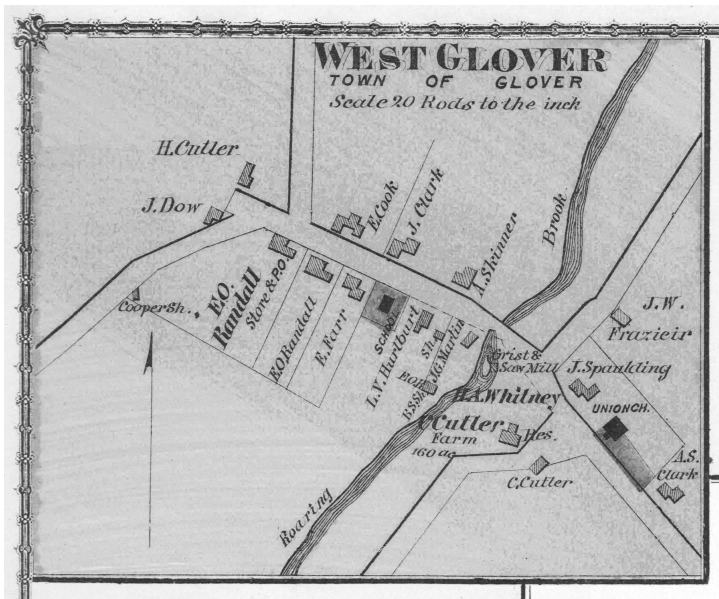
WEST GLOVER VILLAGE

“Boardman Hollow”

West Glover Village was known as **Boardman Hollow**, after the Boardman family who settled here around 1800. About 1840 this area was chosen as a better site for the village than the Parker Settlement, because of the water power produced by Roaring Brook at the outlet of Lake Parker.

In 1804 Nathan Cutler built a sawmill on the southwest corner of what is now Parker and County Roads. The E.O. Randall Country Store was built in the 1850s. The

small building on the back lawn of Parker Pie Company was a Cooper Shop. A Creamery, built in 1889, stood where the Glover Ambulance is now. At its peak population in 1860, the census lists 1250 people living within the Town of Glover.
